Inflation this past year has been challenging for all of us. But, what happens when inflation and a fixed income co-exist? Hardship for older adults already struggling to cover basic expenses like food, fuel, utilities, and housing.

According to the National Council on Aging (NCOA), approximately 40% of older Americans rely solely on their Social Security income to get by. As grocery store prices remain higher than normal, the issue of food insecurity among seniors will only get worse.

All of our partners throughout the Brazos Valley have seniors who rely on their services. And to reach people who have difficulty getting to food pantries, Brazos Valley Food Bank (BVFB) offers additional programs to help. Our Senior Outreach Program (SOP) provides supplemental, easy-toprepare nutritious food to seniors at, or with other programs like assisted living centers, home delivered meals like Meals on Wheels, and more.

In the following pages, you will read local stories from seniors living on fixed incomes who are facing hunger. Their access to BVFB supported services and programs is especially important in times of higher than normal prices.

While we all have felt the reality of inflation in our pocketbooks, know that our most vulnerable neighbors, like seniors on fixed incomes, are feeling it greatly. Giving of funds, food, and time, if possible, is needed now more than ever.

Robert and his dog, Prince, are familiar faces at the Washington County Mobile Pantry distribution in Burton. Neighbors and volunteers all have a friendly wave or handshake to offer.

Currently overseeing a nearby ranch, Robert describes himself as a farm hand though his skill set is extensive. "I do a little bit of everything. A little carpentry, a little plumbing. Whatever needs to be fixed, I fix it."

Housing is part of his wage, but he still has to pay for electricity, gas, and other living expenses, which means there's not much left over for food.

So, when Robert needs extra help, he knows he can turn to the Washington County Mobile Food Pantry to access the healthy fruit, vegetables and other staples he needs.
